Dr. Christina Vera is a Florida native and second-generation Cuban registered nurse who has been practicing for nearly 20 years. Dr. Vera is a Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist and graduate of the University of Miami where she completed her Bachelor in Nursing Science and Master in Nursing Science degree with a specialty in Anesthesia. Her clinical career is marked by thirteen years of practice in a variety of settings including a university teaching hospital and south Florida facilities servicing urban and underserved populations and outpatient surgical populations. Dr. Vera graduated with her Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) degree in 2015 from Barry University and continued her education at Vanderbilt University where she completed her Doctor of Philosophy in Nursing degree in with a focus on the Health Services Research track in 2020. Dr. Vera has published on both clinical issues and the utility highfidelity simulation in nurse anesthesia training. SPRING 2023 SAND AND SURF FANA By: Leidy Escobar C/O 2023



Leidy Escobar is a Florida International University's Department of Nurse Anesthesiology Class of 2023 student. She has been a registered nurse for 12 years. Her research interest lies in cardiovascular-compromised patients and hemodynamic stabilization during the intraoperative period.

FANA Presentation:

Remimazolam as an Alternative Induction Agent in Monitored Anesthesia Care with Cardiac Interventional Patients.

"Propofol is a favored intravenous anesthetic for its quick onset of action and short half-life. However, propofol substantially reduces systolic, diastolic, and mean arterial (MAP) pressures. Clinically, a decline in arterial pressure reduces cardiac output, which may cause myocardial ischemia, postoperative organ failure, and even death. Hemodynamic stability is particularly critical during cardiac interventional procedures for cardiac patients have poor cardiovascular reserve function, rendering it demanding to tolerate the effects of anesthetics on their circulatory function. Despite its potential for severe adverse hemodynamic effects, propofol remains the leading intravenous anesthetic agent for the induction of transesophageal echocardiography, endocardial cardioversion, transthoracic electrical cardioversion, and other various cardiac procedures. With cardiac procedures being related to high incidences of postoperative complications and patient mortality, anesthesia providers must be well-versed regarding the effects of anesthetic drugs on intraprocedural hypotension and its implications for postoperative mortality. The evidence-based research sought to compare the effectiveness and hemodynamic profile of remimazolam versus propofol for the induction of anesthesia with the purpose to provide an alternative induction agent for monitored anesthesia care (MAC)."


