
1. Dress for Success: Wear your FIU white coat and business attire



Congratulations are in order to the Class of 2026 for their exceptional SEE scores with a total average of 439 and a high score of 489! The SEE provides valuable feedback in ensuring students are prepared for National Board Certification. Taken during the second year of the program, these SEE scores can then be compared to the national total average from students at the same level in 2024, which was 411.


